


Reports





The technical reports in this section are produced by institutions such as international and government agencies, NGOs, and academic and advocacy groups. Even when they do not usually undergo peer or academic review, they are closely tied to the rigor of the bodies that produced them. From data gathering to reporting, these reports observe ethical standards, research protocols, and accountability mechanisms. These reports are also usually made in partnership with institutions and LGBTQIA+ scholars and practitioners.

Technical reports are practical tools for internal use, as they inform programs, plans, and advocacy priorities within the implementing organization. Externally, especially with these reports' focus on fieldwork and reach in far-flung communities, these are used by policymakers, journalists, legislators, and educators as sources of evidence.

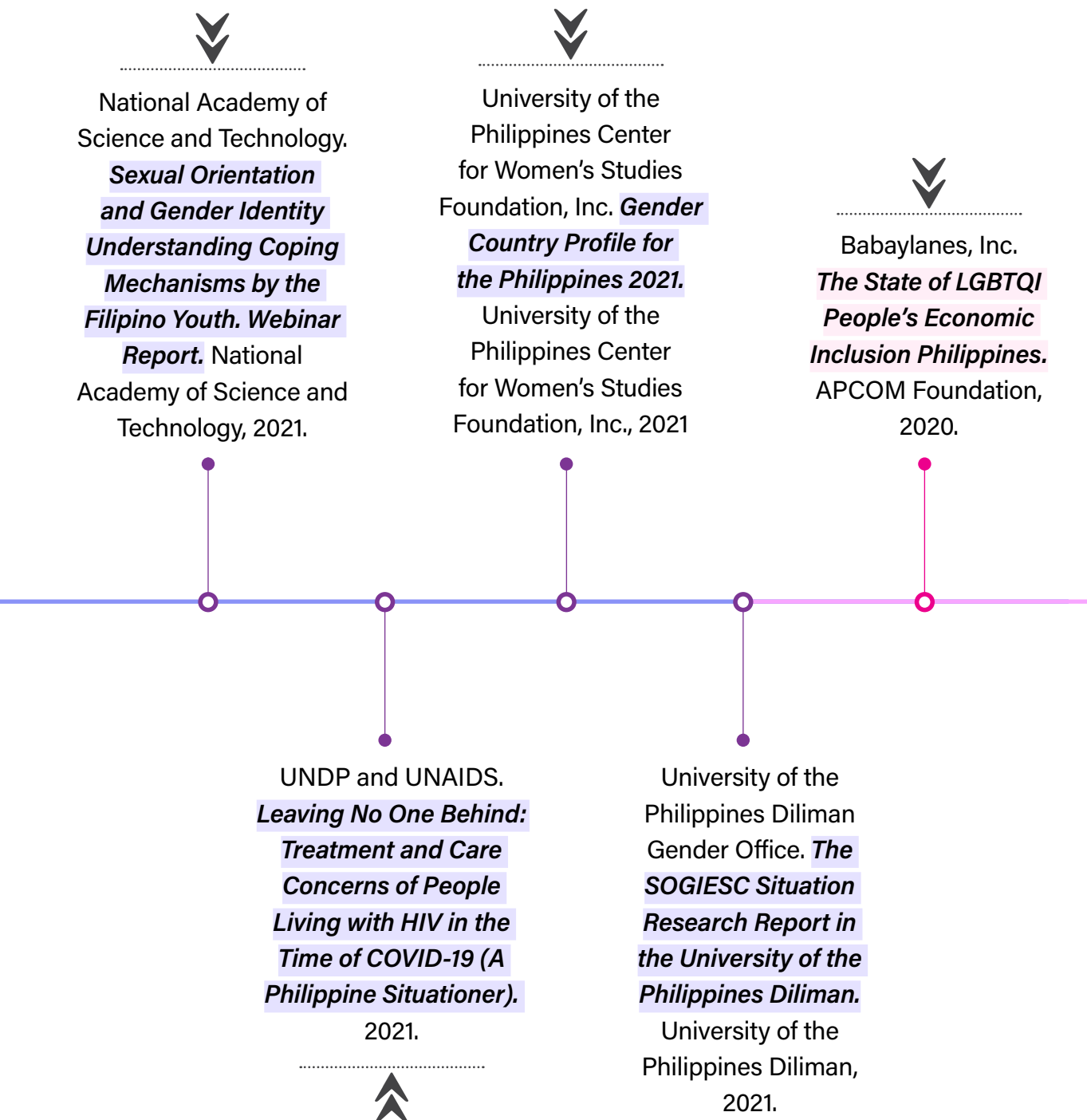

Luis Emmanuel A. Abesamis is a health social scientist and gender studies scholar with transdisciplinary training in anthropology, sociology, and psychology. Their research interests include transgender health, the social histories of public health and medicine, critical drug policy studies, gender equity and social inclusion, and community health engagement. Across their scholarship, Luis leverages community-engaged methodologies and critical social theories to foreground how health inequities among gender and sexual minorities in the Philippines are products of long-standing and co-constitutive systems of oppression.

Currently, Luis is a fellow at the UP Center for Women's and Gender Studies, an affiliated researcher with the Decolonial Studies Research Network, and a member of Hong Kong University Centre for Criminology's Harm Reduction Drug Policy Impact Research Hub. They also serve as a member of the International Advisory Board of the Community Development Journal (Oxford University Press) and as the Treasurer of the Philippine Sociological Society.
